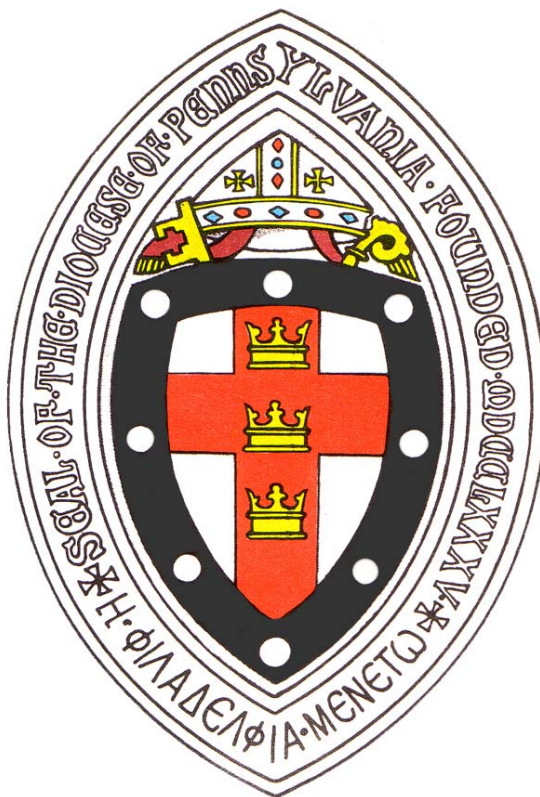

According to the "Act of Association" (p.5), it states that ". . . *such Clergymen and Lay Deputies as shall at any Time be duly assembled in Convention shall be a Quorum; and on every Question, the Votes of a Majority of those present of the two Orders respectively shall decide.*" Therefore, we have a quorum as a duly assembled body for the purpose of Convention. However, should there have been matters of changes to the Constitution & Canons (*and there are none for this year*), in that case a majority of 1/3 of the all eligible Clergy and Lay delegates would constitute a quorum. As it so happens, we have well in excess of the required 49 parishes 126 out of 145, and we have well in excess of the required 118 resident Clergy 173 out of 353, so we have a quorum even as need to accomplish that business if we were going to do so. The Right Reverend Armando Guerra from the Diocese of Guatemala thanked St. David's and the Diocese of Pennsylvania for making it possible to attend this convention. When the relationship began, Bishop Bartlett was enthusiastic and made trips to Guatemala visiting a good number of congregations. The youth of Guatemala enjoyed the visit with the youth from Pennsylvania. Bishop Guerra is enjoying the new relationship with Bishop Michel, who has shown willingness to build a relationship with the Guatemalan Episcopal Church while working with the complications of the Diocese. The following congregations were recognized that support congregations in Guatemala: St. David's, Radnor, St. Martin-in-the-Fields, Chestnut Hill, St. Peter's, Philadelphia, St Peter's, Glenside, Messiah, Church of Our Savior, Holy Trinity, Lansdale and Gloria Dei. Contributions cover Mission Ministry, Education and Social betterment. Scholarships support 350 students in all levels of education. Health programs improve the living conditions and beneficial to people living in San Carlos and Santa Lucia. Two church buildings were constructed Santiago El Menor and San Miguel Arcangel. Community leaders were trained in social ministries. Hymnals of collected music and hymns used in the Diocese were printed. Hundreds of Prayer Books improve the worship of congregations. "Ties of love and friendship have been established between the people and congregations of both Dioceses and I am sure that these bonds will last long even after our formal relationship would be over." These are difficult times for our Diocese which received a 30% cut from the National Church. Guatemala was shocked when General Convention decided not to honor the covenant established between the two Dioceses. "The Episcopal Church of Guatemala needs your prayers, the support you are giving to our children, youth and people in mission, and especially your love and care."

The Diocesan Financial Health continues to improve. Pledges received in 2009 running close

to those received in 2008. There is \$300,000 in cash reserves at the end of the year.

The 2008 audit was completed and rendered a qualified opinion because ECS and Cathedral Village are not included in the consolidated financial statements. The number of recommendations over the last years continue to be reduced. In 2005 there were 21 recommendations. It was reduced in 2006 to 11 recommendations. In 2007 there were only seven recommendations. In 2008 there were only five recommendations. Special thanks were extended to Keel Jones and Rush Smith for the hard work of the Diocese.

**Presentation of the Budget for the Episcopate**

Assessments remain the same this year as last year. Bishop Bennison salary is \$170,000. However, his benefits were left out of the 2009 budget. The amount was corrected in the 2010 budget. The 2009 Episcopate budget is balanced at \$1,221,505. Legal Reserve Fund is for pending court cases. The 15% increase in support staff is due to increase in health benefits Support staff are not receiving a pay increase this year.

We will then break for lunch and the blessing and dismissal will occur at the close of the Convention. This places our work this afternoon within the sacred context of the Holy Eucharist and renders the dismissal so much more meaningful and timely as we are sent back out into the world to be the hands and heart of Christ.

On behalf of the Liturgical Commission, I extend our prayer that this time of common worship will be a source of blessing and renewal to you and to all of us. As we gather once more to lift up our hearts at the altar table of God, may we be nourished, reconciled, and strengthened for the mission to which God has called us.

# APPENDICES

to the

## MINUTES OF CONVENTION



## Standing Rules of Order

1. Reports of Committees and Commissions shall be received without motion to receive them, and it shall be understood that all special committees are discharged upon making their Reports, unless the Convention recommits matters to them for their future consideration, or unless they report their work unfinished.
2. No member shall speak more than once in the same debate, without leave of the House.
3. When a debatable motion is before the Convention, those who wish to speak in support of, or against, the motion shall identify themselves as being "Pro" or "Con." After the mover has spoken to the motion, the Chair shall recognize a speaker in opposition, then a speaker in favor, and so on in like order.
4. Except by the vote of a majority of Convention, no resolution shall be debated longer than twenty (20) minutes.
5. Each individual speaker to a resolution is limited to three (3) minutes.
6. The microphone will be turned off at the end of each speaker's time, after a ten-second warning.
7. A question being once determined shall stand as the judgment of the House, and shall not again be drawn into debate during the same meeting of the Convention, unless with the consent of two-thirds of the House.
8. No motion shall be considered as before the House unless it be seconded and reduced to writing when required.
9. The question on a motion for adjournment shall be taken before any other and without debate.
10. If a motion to lay on the table an amendment or a substitute be carried, the matter before the House shall be proceeded with as if no such amendment or substitute had been offered.
11. When the question is upon the passage of a debatable resolution, amendments or substitute, the mover thereof may in all cases be allowed one five (5) minutes' time in which to close the debate.
12. When a motion to lay upon the table is made and seconded, the mover of the original motion shall have such time as the presiding officer may permit to present reasons why the motion to lay upon the table should not prevail.
13. The doctrines of Parliamentary Law, as set forth in the treatise of *Robert on Parliamentary Law*, are adopted as authoritative expositions of parliamentary practice as far as applicable to the conditions of the meetings of the Diocesan Convention.
14. These rules of order may be suspended or permanently changed by a two-thirds vote, and not otherwise.

# Resolutions — 2009

## REPORT OF THE RESOLUTIONS COMMITTEE

The Resolutions Committee received eight resolutions. There were no proposed canonical changes this year. Three of these (R-1 through R-3) are Resolutions of Courtesy or Commemoration. These were not presented at the pre-convention meetings, as they are not likely to be the subject of any debate. They will be presented as a package for approval early in the 226th Convention. This is the “consent calendar” procedure that has been used successfully for several years. If a deputy knows of a reason why any of these resolutions should be heard separately, he/she should speak to the Dispatch of Business to have that resolution removed from the consent calendar for a separate vote. Resolutions R-4 through R-8, along with the budgetary resolutions, were presented for discussion at six pre-convention meetings held during September and early October at various locations throughout our diocese. Total attendance for the pre-convention meetings this year was approximately 260 people.

### **RA-2010 RESOLUTION ON CLERGY FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE ASSESSMENT**

The amount requested, \$110,000, is the same amount as last year. The assessment will be \$118,280. It was explained that since some congregations are not meeting their assessment, the higher amount must be apportioned to receive the needed \$110,000.

### **RB-2010 ON CLERGY COMPENSATION**

The 2010 salary guidelines have not been changed from the 2009 figures.

### **R-BUD 2010**

Members of the Program Budget Committee presented the proposed 2010 program budget at each of the six pre-convention meetings. There were some questions about specifics for particular line items, including questions about funding for our mission congregations. Members of the Program Budget Committee answered the questions. The budget was well received, and several people commented that the 2010 budget is more realistic than budgets in recent years. The narrative portion of the budget was appreciated. The budget generated much less discussion than in previous years. The Program Budget Committee was thanked for their work.

***The Committee on Resolutions recommends approval of R BUD 2010, along with RA 2010 and RB 2010.***

All resolutions were well received at the pre-convention meetings. There was some discussion about the appropriate verb (encourage, request, authorize), when a resolution asks for action from the bishop. The final versions of some resolutions reflect changes as a result of suggestions made during the pre-convention meeting process. An earlier version of R-8 asked for youth voice and vote on vestries, where not prohibited by law. This resolution was revised after consultation with the Chancellor, since Pennsylvania law includes these restrictions.

***The Committee on Resolutions recommends approval of all resolutions presented at the pre-convention meetings.***



We have noted that the total attendance at pre-convention meetings was significantly lower this year. In previous years, total attendance has been 400-500. This year, total attendance was 260. This could be the result of holding fewer meetings.

We would like to thank all who participated in the pre-convention meetings for their time and thoughtful comments.

# Resolution Establishing Diocesan Anglican Covenant Committee

**RESOLVED:** The Diocese of Pennsylvania shall engage in an intentional process of study, conversation and comment of the Anglican Covenant proposed in the most recent text of the Covenant Design Group (the "Ridley Cambridge Draft") as well as any successive drafts.

**RESOLVED:** In order to facilitate this process and in keeping with the spirit and intent of DO20, Convention resolves to authorize the Bishop to immediately form a Diocesan Anglican Covenant Committee, whose primary responsibility will be to "engage in a process of inviting congregations to consider the Anglican Covenant proposed draft as a document to inform their understanding of and commitment to our common life in the Anglican Communion." This committee to be representative of clergy and laity from each deanery within the diocese

**RESOLVED:** The Diocesan Anglican Covenant Committee is to prepare and deliver a report of their study, finding and recommendations to the 2010 Diocese of Pennsylvania Convention and the Executive Council of The Episcopal Church.

**EXPLANATION:** In 2006, the 75th General Convention of the Episcopal Church passed resolution A166, which supports the participation of the Episcopal Church in the development of an Anglican Covenant. Since then, the Covenant Design Group (CDG) has produced several drafts, culminating in what the members of the CDG believe is the final product of their work, the Cambridge-Ridley Draft.

The 75th General Convention also passed resolution A159, which affirms not only our commitment to interdependence in the Anglican Communion, but a desire to live in "the highest degree of communion possible."

In 2009, the 76<sup>th</sup> General Convention passed resolution DO20 calling all congregations and dioceses to engage in an intentional process of dialog, discussion and debate as to how the Anglican Covenant is to inform and order our common life within the Anglican Communion.

Acknowledging that "bonds of affection" within the Anglican Communion have been severely strained, it seems appropriate that we, the Diocese of Pennsylvania, give prayerful consideration to the Cambridge-Ridley Draft in the context of discerning more fully the nature of our identity as a constituent member of the Anglican Communion of churches.

## **Companion Diocese Relationship with the Diocese of Guatemala**

**RESOLVED:** The Convention of the Diocese of Guatemala concurring, the Diocese of Pennsylvania and the Diocese of Guatemala enter into a sixth three-year term of our companionship relationship for the years 2011-2013.

**EXPLANATION:** The year 2010 marks the third and final year of the fifth three-year term in the companion relationship with the Diocese of Guatemala. Fifteen parishes in the Diocese of Pennsylvania presently maintain active and ongoing relationships with twenty-six congregations in the Diocese of Guatemala. Other congregations in Guatemala are seeking companion relationships.

In addition the Companion Diocese Committee is presently undertaking wellness initiatives based on data gathered by The Epiphany Medical Mission to Guatemala from 2007-2009. These primary prevention initiatives are currently focused on the provision of water-filtration equipment and health education programming to rural communities in an effort to reduce the significant morbidity, mortality and attendant suffering of vulnerable individuals (especially infants and young children) that result from the consumption of contaminated water.

When the last extension was requested it was done with the expectation that our companion relationship would be extensively reviewed for the meeting of this convention. This has not happened. We think such a review should next take place when new leadership is in place. Meanwhile we highly recommend that this work, so beneficial to so many people here and there, continue to grow and flourish with the support of the diocesan and parochial resources as they are made available.

Both the Assisting Bishop of Pennsylvania and the Bishop of Guatemala have indicated their approval of the continuation of the relationship for an additional three years.

The Mission of the Companion Diocese Relationship:

*Through the love of God we are all made one family in Christ. As companion dioceses, we covenant to walk together on our common journey, learning from each other as we share our spiritual, human and material resources at all levels. As companions on the journey, we will encourage and pray for one another and inspire each other in the work we are given to do as Christ's agents in the world about us.*

# Resolution for the Formation of The Diocesan Mission Planning Commission

**RESOLVED:** That this Convention request the Bishop and Standing Committee appoint a Diocesan Mission Planning Commission, broadly representative of the Diocese, to review Christ's mission and ministry through the people of the diocese of Pennsylvania; engage and consult diocesan leadership groups in an evaluation of these ministries, make recommendations for the future, and begin a process of reconciliation to help us move forward together in Christ;

**RESOLVED:** That the core work of the Commission will include:

1. Continuing a process of Christian reconciliation that would allow all members of the Diocese to move together into a new future;
2. Continuing the process of evaluating current missions and ministries and congregations, with appropriate recommendations for affirmation, reconfiguration, or redevelopment;
3. Examining demographic, financial, and cultural trends and their potential impact on future congregational mission and sustainability, mindful of our commitment to eradicate all racist structures, practices, and policies.
4. Envisioning creatively what new structures and ministry models Christ might lead us to in the future, including the establishing of new ministries, missions and congregations;
5. Reporting the preliminary findings and recommendations of the Commission to the 227th Diocesan Convention.

**RESOLVED:** That the Bishop, the Standing Committee and the Diocesan Council allocate up to \$50,000<sup>1</sup> in order to establish and fund a temporarily restricted account specifically for the work of the Commission. Additional gifts received for the work of the Commission will provide supplemental funds as necessary.

### **EXPLANATION:**

The Diocese of Pennsylvania has in recent years gone through a difficult time with some internal conflicts and the Inhibition and Trial of the Bishop, a process whose length is proving difficult to predict under canons new to the Episcopal Church. Some relationships have been severely tested, but by and large, congregations and ministries within the Diocese have continued faithfully and in many cases prospered. A number of diocesan groups have sought to give leadership and support to the people of the Diocese during this time, in various ways such as the Standing Committee's hearings, the Council of Deans' retreat for clergy, the Diocesan Convention's small group discussions, the Urban Strategy Task Force, the 2020 Committee's analysis of trends, and the Mission Strategy Committee's work with congregations facing challenges.

We, the signatories, as well as many others in Diocesan leadership, believe it best that the Diocese of Pennsylvania move forward together in order to address our needs for reconciliation, strengthening our many fine ministries, and to look with open eyes and hearts to the future toward which Christ calls us. By passing this resolution, Convention will provide the structural mechanism for the consolidation and continuation of the good work and energy which has already begun.

This resolution is intended to launch a wide-ranging, in depth look at what is going on in this strong diocese, in the Church at large, and in the wider society. The work of this Commission will focus primarily on a process of information gathering and data assessment. The results of this effort will be used to provide a foundation for prayerful vision-casting; dreaming and articulating what might be the Church of the future—grounded in the particular gifts the Episcopal Church and the Diocese of Pennsylvania have to offer. It should be noted, this resolution is offered with the expressed intent of providing both findings and recommendations at the 2010 Convention. Finally, and more immediately, the resolution asks the new Commission to oversee and consolidate the continued process of reconciliation within the Diocese, possibly involving other leadership, acknowledging that such reconciliation may not be complete for some years. This major effort, which assumes some large meetings, several consultants, and clear reporting to the Diocese, will need substantial funding as referenced in the resolution.

God will resolve the question of Episcopal leadership here in God's good time. We are blessed presently with a full time Assisting Bishop committed for the years immediately ahead. It seems appropriate to deal with the present, plan for these years, and allow ourselves to seek to envision where Christ might be calling us in the future.

#### **REFERENCES:**

At its meeting on May 9, 2009, the Diocesan Council unanimously requested that the 2020 Committee prepare a Diocesan Council resolution for the 2009 Diocesan Convention that would ask the Diocese of Pennsylvania to undertake a vision and mission development process utilizing consultants and data collection.

## Resolution to Recommit to the Creation of an Anti-Racist Diocese

**RESOLVED:** That the 226<sup>th</sup> Convention of the Episcopal Diocese of Pennsylvania strongly endorse the work of the Antiracism Team, which has been called into being by the diocesan Antiracism Commission, and which has been commissioned at said Convention to carry forward the antiracism work of the Diocese, including the transformation of all racist structures, practices, and policies that are barriers to the full inclusion and full access to power by persons of color at every level of the life and ministry within and beyond the Diocese.

**RESOLVED:** That the Episcopal Diocese of Pennsylvania and every congregation and constituent body within the Diocese recommit themselves with time, conscientious attention, and material resources to the vital work of antiracism in our Diocese and in the region, with the full acknowledgment that this grievous sin continues to afflict and bedevil our common life as the body of Christ.

**EXPLANATION:** The budget of The Episcopal Church (TEC) for the 2010-2012 triennium, passed at General Convention 2009, was reduced to \$140.8 million from the \$163.9 million budget of the 2007-2009 triennium, representing a 14% cut. Among the ministries most drastically affected was Antiracism, Racial Justice, and Gender Equality, reduced from \$1.98 million to \$1.19 million (40%). The Presiding Bishop expressed to the church her hope and prayer that those ministries being cut back at the level of the Episcopal Church as a whole could be taken up with renewed vigor and attention by provinces and dioceses. As we in the Diocese of Pennsylvania can expect much less support and guidance from the central structures of The Episcopal Church, we must assume the additional material and spiritual responsibilities required for the work of antiracism if our vision of the Diocese of Pennsylvania as an antiracist structure is to be realized.

In light of the momentous political events of the last two years in the United States, some have been pleading for a continuing and systemic “racial divide” in our nation when it comes to the distribution of poverty and wealth, and of opportunity and access. In the current recession, people of color suffer disproportionately: “Black unemployment is now at 15.1 percent, compared with 8.9 percent for whites. . . . By 2010, according to Lawrence Mishel of the Economic Policy Institute, 40 percent of African-Americans nationwide will have endured patches of unemployment or underemployment” (Ehrenreich & Muhammad, 2009). As always happens during times of economic distress, divisions of class and race become more pronounced. Despite the residence of an African-American family in the White House, systemic racism continues to flourish in American society. As followers of Christ in the Diocese of Pennsylvania, we are called to reinvigorate our efforts to eradicate this pernicious evil.

## Resolution: R-8-2009

### Youth Voice

**RESOLVED:** That this Diocesan Convention of the Episcopal Diocese of Pennsylvania, in concurrence with Resolution D065 of the 76<sup>th</sup> General Convention of the Episcopal Church, encourage all congregations, deaneries and diocesan bodies to actively cultivate and solicit the voice of youth, ages sixteen to eighteen.

**RESOLVED:** That each parish and deanery be encouraged to include opportunities, for the voice of youth, ages sixteen to eighteen, to be heard on their governing bodies.

**RESOLVED:** That diocesan bodies and committees be encouraged to include opportunities, for the voice of youth, ages sixteen to eighteen, to be heard, especially in areas of mission planning and visioning for the future.

**EXPLANATION:** This resolution recognizes young people as full members of the Body of Christ, and acknowledges that through their baptism, confirmation and sharing in the communion of the Body and Blood of Christ, they have many gifts to share with the church. It also continues the call to the church to “appreciate children's abilities and readiness to represent Christ and his church, to bear witness to him wherever they may be, and according to gifts given them, to carry on Christ's work of reconciliation in the world, and to take their place in the life, worship, and governance of the church. [(Ministry of the Laity pg. 855 BCP) from the Children's Charter for the Church.] It too recognizes that while there are certain issues where civil laws prohibit youth from fully participating in the decision making process, their perspective and voice is still valuable to the church.

Additionally, young people given this opportunity have found that their participation has been a transformative experience, in which their voices have been heard. This experience will help to give youth a sense of ownership in the church, while encouraging and preparing them to engage in church leadership in the future.

# Treasurer's Report to Diocesan Convention

November 14, 2009

Good Afternoon.

I would like to report on the overall Diocesan financial health including our audit report, the state of accounting and internal controls, and the Treasurer's office.

## **Diocesan Financial Health Continues to Improve**

I am delighted to report that the Diocese is in good overall financial health. In 2009 the collection of pledges and assessments in total is running close to the 2008 levels despite a worsening economy. The Diocese is living within its budgeted means, the Consolidated Fund has grown approaching 30% since the first of the year and we will end the year with about \$300K in cash reserves, effectively where we began in January 2009. A realistic and lean 2010 budget and attention to spending detail will allow us to maintain our financial momentum. We continue to address the goal to ensure all Diocesan expenditures are contained within a budget.

## **The 2008 Audit Yielded a Qualified Opinion**

The 2008 audit of our financial records was completed (as required by the National Church) in August and the auditors rendered a "Qualified" opinion (the same opinion as the last few years). An "Unqualified" opinion requires that all financial statements be prepared in accordance with Generally Accepted Accounting Principles and one such principle requires that all entities which the Diocese has control over be consolidated in the financial results. Since we have elected not to include ECS and the Cathedral Village in our consolidated financial statements, as we have done in the past, the auditors could not render an "Unqualified" (the best) opinion. This audit report is or will be available on the DIOPA website shortly

## **Internal and Accounting Controls Continue to Improve**

Our independent auditors provide a "management" letter, sometimes known as an internal control letter in which they highlight internal control deficiencies and recommendations for improvement. Over the last few years the number of recommendations has come down considerably indicating overall improvement in accounting and internal controls.

## **Resolution on the Clergy Financial Assistance Assessment for 2010**

Wherefore, upon recommendation of the Commission Clergy Salaries and Pensions Commission:

That the Clergy Financial Assistance Assessment be supported at the level to raise \$110,000 for 2010, and

That \$90,000 shall be used to provide basic financial assistance to clergy, and

That \$20,000 of the Assessment be used to continue building a Sabbatical Leave Fund to assist parishes and other institutions in the Diocese which cannot alone support a sabbatical for their clergy.

Be it therefore Resolved that the total CFA assessment shall be \$118, 280<sup>2</sup>, shall remain unchanged for Fiscal Year 2010, and shall be apportioned to each parish in the Diocese of Pennsylvania

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<sup>2</sup> The Commission on Clergy Salaries and Pensions is charged with the responsibility of recommending to Diocesan Convention two of the three mandatory assessments: RCMA, and the Clergy Financial Assistance Assessment. These two assessments, along with the Episcopate Assessment, which is set by another diocesan entity, are mandatory for each parish. It was the judgment of the Commission, given the vagaries of the financial markets, the growing fiscal crunch in parishes, and other important considerations, that it would be prudent to keep the 2010 CFA at 2009 levels. Should the financial need arise during 2010, and assistance funds be used up, Clergy Salaries and Pensions Commission will work together with other entities in the Diocese to provide emergency funding where true need exists.

Ranges shall extend two salary categories above and below the midpoint.

It is the policy of the Diocese of Pennsylvania that that the range midpoint is the appropriate salary for a thoroughly competent incumbent. Merit increases thereafter shall be added to cost-of-living increases, as warranted by periodic reviews.

Transitional Deacons use "0" as the factor for computing an initial salary. Upon ordination to the Priesthood the factor becomes "1".

#### II. PART-TIME CLERGY

That total compensation (*Note 4*) for priests who are employed part-time (other than as supply priests) shall be proportional to the total compensation for a priest holding the same position on a full-time basis.

Mileage, paid at the current IRS rate, and/or other related expenses should be paid in addition to cash compensation.

#### Explanatory Notes:

##### **(Note 1)**

"Cash compensation" shall be defined as cash salary plus housing allowance plus 50% SECA. Cash compensation does not include reimbursement for expenses, (e.g., for automobile use or continuing education.) nor health and pension premiums.

##### **(Note 2)**

Compensation for a rector/vicar/interim/priest-in-charge shall be based upon the corresponding Congregational Size Category as defined by the following formulas. Parochial Reports due March 2009 shall be used for these calculations.

People Index # = (Parochial Report Page 3, Number 1 + P.R. Page 2, Number 6) divided by 2

Financial Index # = (Parochial Report Page 3, Letter E + P.R. Page 3, Number 3) divided by 2

Compare to size chart and use the higher of the two.

**(Note 3)**

The 2010 salary figures for full-time clergy have not been changed from the 2009 figures. Each vestry should designate by resolution an adequate, specific portion of cash compensation to be "housing allowance" in order to permit eligible clergy to exclude from federal taxable income any housing costs that are paid directly from gross income. (Housing costs include furnishings, mortgage payments, all utilities, and any items normally covered by rent.)

**(Note 4)**

"Total compensation" is defined as cash compensation (as defined in *Note 1*) plus provisions for pension and for health and life insurance if required in accordance with *Note 5*.

**(Note 5)**

Cash compensation for supply clergy is based on full-time compensation. It does not reflect an increase from 2009. (The table is based on the proposition that there are 263 working days per year. A congregation is obligated to pay Church Pension Fund assessments for clergy employed for three months or more and who earn \$50 or more per month, unless already on pension.)

The following policy statements have been approved by previous Conventions and directed by Convention to be placed in delegate packets for their information.

## **POLICY ON AUTOMOBILE AND OTHER EXPENSES**

The policy on allowances and reimbursements for work-related expenses is reaffirmed as follows:

All "business" expenses, e.g., those expenses that would normally be reimbursed in secular employment, shall be reimbursed and provided for in adequate allowances in congregation budgets.

The Internal Revenue Service generally recognizes two methods of accounting for Automobile Expenses. In Method One, which is recommended by the Commission on Clergy Salaries and Pensions, in consultation with the *Manual of Business Methods in Church Affairs*, and financial counsel to the Commission, The Rev. Canon William Geisler, CPA, appropriate automobile expenses, including mileage, tolls, parking and other related expenses are reimbursed to the clergy. Mileage is to be paid at the current IRS rate.

The older method, a monthly automobile allowance, is still permissible under IRS guidelines; however, all records of the use of Automobile Allowance, including mileage, parking, tolls and other related expenses, must be documented. At the end of each year, any automobile allowance which has been disbursed but not used, must be included by the cleric as taxable income.

In both methods, timely, documented, reimbursement requests are to be submitted by the clergy, approved by the appropriate Warden or Vestry, and kept on record by the Parish.



## Convention Resolution for the Adoption of the Proposed 2010 Diocesan Program Budget

**RESOLVED:** That the 226<sup>th</sup> Convention of the Diocese of Pennsylvania adopt the proposed Diocesan Program Budget for 2010, as presented by the Program Budget Committee, reviewed by the Committee on Finance & Property, and approved by Diocesan Council and Standing Committee.

### **EXPLANATION: A Narrative Introduction to the 2010 Program Budget**

Crafting the 2010 Budget meant wrestling with two significant challenges: reduced endowment income and an increasingly unpredictable base of parish giving. However, by digging deep to clarify facts and by conservatively projecting our income, we have produced a financially sound document. This was possible only because of the tremendous cooperation and open sharing of information that took place at all levels of this process. It involved all areas of leadership including Diocesan Council, Standing Committee, Finance and Property and Church House staff, and we are very pleased to report that everyone was able to set aside any previous suspicions or hard feelings and work together for the good of the Diocese. However, while this is indeed an achievement to be celebrated, this balanced budget comes at a significant cost in terms of cuts to almost every category. We have tried to spread the financial pain evenly and fairly. We recognize that some of the programs affected by the cuts are long established and politically charged, but the dire financial realities meant that no program could claim immunity. Some areas of note include the following:

- 1) All Souls' Church for the Deaf: We are recommending that All Souls' draw on its sizable endowment in order to meet its expenses. This was the case in 2008, but in 2009 the cost of its clergy was funded by the Diocese. Given the twin realities of their large endowment and dwindling membership, we firmly believe that the most ethical choice was for All Souls' to draw on their own funds at this time. It is important to note that, even under these conditions, the congregation can afford to stay open for many years.
- 2) Income Generation: We have added an income line for Anti-Racism in the hopes that all specialized ministries in the Diocese will follow the lead of Campus Ministry, Youth and others, and work to raise some of their own funding.
- 3) Employee Raises: At the direction of Bishop Michel, there are no raises scheduled for Diocesan employees for 2010.
- 4) Financial Assistance to Parishes: This process, which was once a Sub-committee of Finance and Property, came directly under the auspices of the PBC. The Financial Assistance Sub-committee created a very thorough and fair system to evaluate all requests for aid. Kudos to George Whitfield and his team for their fine work. Specifics on their process and rationale can be found on the next page.

Of course, there are many other changes. Brief explanations can be found within the budget itself. Should you have other questions, we will do our very best to give specific answers.

One last issue that we wish to bring to your attention is that stewardship is of vital importance to the success of this budget. It is our plan to work both with the various ministries supported by this budget and with Diocesan Council to help tell the story of all the good work that our Diocese is doing. We hope this will increase awareness and generate some more excitement and help the individual parishes understand what we are doing and what is in it for them. It is





essential that everyone understand that if they do not do their part to support the budget, these vital and exciting ministries cannot continue. Building awareness and ownership is essential since, even though our proposed number for parish giving is fairly modest, this budget cannot succeed without the committed involvement of all our parishes. The bottom line is this: there is no fat left to trim... if the parishes do not pledge to support the budget, it will result in the loss of jobs and programs.

### **On the Financial Assistance Sub-Committee**

The Financial Assistance Sub-Committee of the Program Budget Committee received 14 applications for financial assistance from the 2010 Program Budget. All completed applications were considered. Most of the parishes seeking aid had applied in previous years. One congregation which had not applied in previous years applied and was granted aid. In most cases, the entire amount requested was for clergy salary and/or salary connected with programs in the congregations. The committee tried to be equitable in allocating the \$238,054 provided for aid under this section of the Program Budget. We took into account both any previous agreements congregations may have had with the Diocese and the amount requested.

The sub-committee looked at information provided by the applicants, which included answers to the sub-committee's questionnaire, parochial reports, the most recent completed audit (2007) and the year-to-date financials for 2009. From this information, the committee looked at several criteria. The criteria included but were not limited to the growth (or potential growth) of the congregation, the financial situation of the congregation and the average pledge of the congregants compared to the average dollar amount spent by the congregation for each congregant.

In most instances, where a church had an endowment, the full amount of aid requested was not granted. The committee felt that it was more important to help congregations without an endowment, and to provide for clergy salary, than to pay for programs themselves.

### **Notes on Specific Items**

Although the budget is annotated with notes on many of the line items, we want to make sure that everyone understands how and why certain numbers increased or decreased. Below you will find an explanation for every line that changed by a significant amount from 2009.

- # 3) Congregational Giving:** While this is only a slight increase over 2009, we recognize that income from endowments will go down for 2010. Therefore this number represents a significant commitment from the parishes. However, we believe that the parishes will step up to support the core values of ministry and mission that this budget represents. Should the amount pledged exceed our projections (after factoring in a 10% margin for non-payment), then Diocesan Council has directed that those monies may be used to fund the work of the Diocesan Mission Planning Commission.
- #4) Endowment Income:** The drop of endowment represents both a drop in value and a likely decrease in the payout amount by Church Foundation, from 4.75% back to 4.5%.
- #5) Parker Bulmer Income:** See line #4
- #6) All Souls' Endowment:** See page one for a detailed explanation.
- #14) Anti-Racism:** This committee will raise some of its own money by asking participants to contribute a small portion towards their training expenses.
- #15) Youth:** This line increased simply because the ministry will be asking its participants to contribute towards their participation in some of its events.
- #16) Servant Year:** This line is being added to the PB but it is only a pass through.
- #32) All Souls' Church:** This line reflects both the Vicar's salary & benefits plus an additional \$9,823 for program. All these funds are drawn from their own endowment.
- #38) St. George/St. Barnabas:** To their great credit, this mission has become self-sustaining and so is graduating off the DCMM roles.
- #48) Trinity Coatesville:** Trinity requested \$17K this year. This parish is a model of successful and creative fund raising. Their effectiveness has allowed them to build up a small endowment and



we have confidence that they will be able to find the \$7,000 that we did not award them through other means.

- #49) Trinity Collingdale/Boothwyn:** Trinity requested \$45K in aid this year. This parish has moved into a new home in Boothwyn and has put their old building up for sale. Once it sells, they will be allowed to use the interest generated by the invested principle. This money should be more than adequate to fill the gap.
- #52) All Saints, Darby:** Although All Saints did not receive any grant aid last year, they did receive \$29K in special funding through Standing Committee. This year we granted money for clergy.
- #54) Church of the Crucifixion:** In 2009 this parish received a special grant from Standing Committee to allow them to pay a part time clergy person. Although we could not fund all of their request, we opted to grant them as much as possible so that they could try and retain their priest.
- #55) St. Mary's, Chester:** Due to some miscommunication, St. Mary's did not receive any grant aid last year. However, they were granted a special award of \$8,500 by the Standing Committee. This year we worked with the parish leadership to make sure their application got completed and granted them money to hire clergy and a musician.
- #61) Youth Programs:** Youth Ministry is raising the additional monies budgeted to be spent.
- #67) General Convention:** Although there is no GC in 2010 we felt it prudent to split up the cost so as to avoid a big hit every three years.
- #70) Summer Camp:** Several factors contributed to this cut. First is our belief that people can and should pay as much as they are able to participate in programs like this. Second, we feel that the new City Camp offers an alternative for teens who are looking for a camp experience, and finally, there seems to be a limited number of campers participating over the last two years.
- #74) Education and Training Programs:** We felt that these programs, although important, were underutilized by the Diocese at this time.
- #84) Finance & Administration Staff:** Through taking a hard look at expenses, we were able to tighten up this line considerably. No staff positions were eliminated.
- #95) Congregational Planning and Development:** There is no money budgeted for this item but Council felt strongly that should any income come in over and above the budgeted amount, it should be devoted to this purpose.
- #111) Servant Year:** As noted for Line #16 on page 2, this is a pass through item.

### Summary

We hope this document helps make the whole process that has gone into this budget both comprehensible and transparent. We commend the 2010 Program Budget to you for your consideration. We firmly believe that it represents a significant step forward in terms of cooperation and responsibility.

# Convention Address

### ***"The Message of God's Grace"***

The grace of our Lord Jesus the Christ, the love of God and the fellowship of Holy Spirit be with you all. Amen. My sisters and brothers, it is my distinct privilege to stand before you as the Assisting Bishop of Pennsylvania on this Feast of the Consecration of Samuel Seabury as the first American Bishop. Curious isn't it? That we in William White's Diocese should be commemorating Samuel Seabury, whose notion of the episcopate was somewhat different from that of William White; but what happened on this day in 1784 really served as the genesis of the Episcopal Church in the United States of America and that was ratified in Pennsylvania with the consecration of William White. In our Collect, we thanked God for bestowing upon this Church the gift of the episcopate. I am certain that there have been times in the 225 year history of the Diocese of Pennsylvania [and not just recently] that folks have wondered about "the *gift* of the episcopate" but we are Episcopalians and our polity includes bishops and at this time you are stuck with this particular Bishop as part of a great team of players that help this diocese live and move and have its being. The other words of the Collect for this day are poignant, as we prayed that "joined together in unity with our bishops and nourished by the Holy Sacraments we may proclaim the Gospel of Redemption with Apostolic Zeal/" This gives us a model for the work of the Church and the Kingdom: It is called teamwork and together we can do all things through Jesus the Christ. Together – Bishops, Priests, Deacons, and Laity ~ working together in this kingdom ministry. Think of the many team members who do the work of this Diocese. That would include the Standing Committee, the Diocesan Council, members of Finance and Property and the Church Foundation, the Deans and the outstanding staff at Church House who work together as a team to support and encourage one another and work together for God's Kingdom and the mission of the Church in this place. This astounding attendance at Diocesan Convention tells us that there is a new breathe of the Holy Spirit blowing across and within this Diocese and that God's People want to be part of getting on with the Mission of Christ and His Church. As we begin our 226th year of history let it be a Year of Mission and new beginnings as we address the many needs of our communities, our world, and the People of God whom we serve and encourage. Your Convention program has wonderful pictures of the Church at work through the People of God in this Diocese and you have seen an ongoing display of photographs of the work and ministry of mission which we hope many more will want to be part of during this Year of Mission. For now, may I invite you to sit back, relax [but not too much] and receive this address to Diocesan Council which will be longer than the usual 12 minute Episcopal sermon but not intolerably long, I assure you.

In our first reading today, from the Acts of the Apostles, we hear Paul preaching to the Christians at Ephesus: *"Now I commend you to God and to the message of His grace, a message that is able to build you up and to give you the inheritance among all who are sanctified."* "The message of God's grace" – and part of that message of grace is the message of reconciliation. In Paul's Second Letter to the Corinthians chapter 5 verses 18 and following, we read: *"All this is from God, who through Christ reconciled us to Himself and gave us the*



*ministry of reconciliation; that is, in Christ God was reconciling the world to Himself, not counting their trespasses against them, and entrusting to us the message of reconciliation."*  
The ministry and message of reconciliation – the message of God's grace.

I believe with all my heart that it is God's hope that all people be reconciled; and especially that those who bear the name of his Son be reconciled one with another. It is no secret that peace, harmony and unity do not prevail in our diocese. Unrest, unhappiness, suspicion and parochial isolationism run rampant as the H1N1 virus in the Diocese of Pennsylvania and it keeps us from being messengers of God's grace.

The relentless undertow of anxiety and hostility tears us from our neighbors, from our kin in Christ and from our own deepest reality, drawing us out into the depths of strife, isolation, judgmentalism and condemnation, forgetting about kingdom issues. Part of the kingdom issues that Christ calls us to is to be bearers of reconciliation. Being bearers of reconciliation involves working hard at being one in Christ, overcoming our divisions, and showing Christ to a broken and hurting world. Holy Scripture says that we were made for fellowship with one another, for *koinonia*, for togetherness. Part of the plan of creation is that we become fully human only in relationship with our fellow humans and with our God - what African believers call "*Ubuntu*". The Bible is laced through with the story of God's attempt to effect at-one-ment, to bring us back to our intended condition of relatedness. God was, in Christ, reconciling the world to God. Our creator wants to draw us back into an intimate relationship and so bring to unity all that has become disunited, and each of us is called to be an ally of God in this work of reconciliation and restoration.

Dorothy Day, who organized the worker movement earlier in the last century wrote: "We cannot love God unless we love each other. We know Him in the breaking of bread, and we know each other in the breaking of bread, and we are not alone anymore. Heaven is a banquet, and life is a banquet too ~ even with a crust - where there is companionship. We have all known loneliness, and we have learned that the only solution is love, and that love comes with community."

My friends, the sins of the fathers and mothers may be visited upon our progeny in the faith if we do not or cannot model reconciliation for them. Do we want the next generation of Episcopal Christians in the Diocese of Pennsylvania to enter adulthood thinking that the way to be the church is the way we have modeled for them of late?

The church is not a resort for saints, it is an arena of reconciliation for all of God's people. The church is not a fortress to keep out those whose disagree with us, but an open, available place where all who wander in are offered a seat at our table and are welcomed into our fellowship. As ambassadors of reconciliation we need to remember to keep close to our hearts the gospel of love and acceptance and healing that Jesus lived and died for. Everyone was welcomed into our Lord's life and into His discipleship, and that spirit must be valued and promoted by the church in this era. We are to be Christ's hands and feet and heart and mind and we cannot do that if we assume God's role of judgment. The judge's job is filled. God alone is judge! Those who would be Saviors of the Church and the people in it are also reminded that the Savior's job has been filled. Jesus Christ filled it once for all. Part of being bearers of reconciliation in our particular situation and within the larger church, is to remember that we are Anglican Christians. It is time that we recover our mythic consciousness, and rediscover our Anglican ethos. We need to remember a way of doing theology that honors scripture, reason and tradition as well as the variable of experience. My friends, as Episcopal Christians we are not fundamentalists. Dogmatism is not part of our vocabulary or history or ethos. Is there not still value in our Anglican identity and the vocation of our particular celebration of the gospel? Proclaiming the gospel takes large amounts of the not-so-secret ingredients of patience, forgiveness, responsibility, compassion and diligence. We need to re-learn the meaning of



"respectful and loving dialogue" and then practice it. If we are going to be bearers of reconciliation we need to strike the word "winning" from our vocabulary and replace it with "acceptance" and "risk-filled love." You may think my suggestions far too naive and simplistic but for me that is the only way to deal with the sometimes messy and ambiguous, rarely orderly or structured, drama of salvation. Following Jesus as our Lord and Savior is not easy but if the issues and concerns of our present brokenness, if our hopes and our dreams for the church, even our pain and discontent can be marinated in prayer, soaked in the Anglican brine of scripture, tradition and reason then we will be on the road to reconciliation and wholeness.

People of faith, it is time to pray fervently for our diocese and for one another. It is time to repent of the ugly hatred and mistrust of one another that has become almost pandemic. It is time to get serious about the business of being bearers of reconciliation and to claim the promise which is ours. Jesus will lead us to a new depth of faith and understanding and good will and peace ~ with God and with one another.

Please note sisters and brothers that my comments are observations – not judgments.

As a Bishop of the Church of God I subscribe to the words of Saint Augustine : *"For you I am bishop, but with you I am a Christian; one is an office, accepted; the other is a gift, received. One is danger; the other is safety. If I am happier to be redeemed with you than to be placed over you, then I shall, as the Lord commanded, be more fully your Servant.* Remember that little verse we learned as children:

*I am the Church*

*You are the Church*

*We are the Church together*

As the gathered Church we also remember that we have so much to celebrate. We have the wonderful Companion relationship with Guatemala where lives are being changed through the medical mission, the water purification project and gifts of money and human kindness. Our Youth Ministry has blossomed under the capable leadership of Andrew Kellner with City Camp, summer camping, Cathedral nights and a long list of activities and programs for the youth of our Diocese. A wonderful Woman's Ministry conference was held earlier this autumn with Jane Williams and Phoebe Griswold and others inspiring women of our diocese. The DCMM program, while underfunded, is an amazing work of mission and bringing Christ to challenged places through the ministry of our DCMM clergy. We have new hopes and dreams for urban ministry, a beautiful Cathedral with an innovative and exciting liturgical life and plans for outreach and ministry to the neighborhood it serves as well as to the Diocese. The Seamen's Church Institute has an amazing ministry to seafarers from all over the world. So many of our congregations have food pantries, feeding programs, and homeless shelters, and many of our congregations help struggling congregations and people in need in greater Philadelphia and around the world, but the need is so great, and as our Lord said: "the laborers are few." Our streets are filled with people waiting to hear the Good News, to have their wounded bodies and souls bound up, to be visited in the prisons, be fed and encouraged and cheered on the journey ~ the need is great and we have the message of God's grace to share, if we can but recognize it and then begin to share and live it.

*I am the Church*

*You are the Church*

*We are the Church together.*

Now, if only we can begin to believe that and learn to live it more fully.

An old English prayer says: "Take time to laugh . . . it is the music of the soul."





Pray, work, laugh, all to the glory of God. Allow me to close with one short story.

A senior citizen named Joe lived with his hound, Mace, in a rundown shack on the outskirts of town. He had no family and very few material possessions. Joe had a few tools which he used to do odd jobs in the village and make just enough money for he and Mace to live on. Mace was a normal bloodhound, with one exception, he loved grass. You know some dogs like to eat grass occasionally but Mace ate it all the time and he would lie in the yard grazing away. One sunny day old Joe headed into town to do a plumbing job. It was a big job and he knew it would bring enough money to buy food for a week, so he had a spring in his step and a whistle on his lips. When he got to town he discovered that his pipe wrench was missing: without the wrench he could not do the job, and without the job he couldn't buy food. He explained his dilemma to the woman of the house but she had no compassion on him. He told her he would check at home and return with the wrench. When he arrived there was Mace chewing away on the lawn. When the blood hound saw his master, he came running to greet him. Kneeling beside the hound, old Joe began to pet him. Without money to buy a new wrench, he had no idea what the future held. It was the loneliest, most helpless feeling ever. Then he caught a glimpse of something shining in the grass. It was the wrench. The old man had dropped it on his way out that morning and it would have been lost forever had Mace not eaten the grass around the house. The old man grabbed the dog and gave him a hug and ran into the house. Reaching for a pencil and paper he wrote the following moving tribute to his canine companion. You will recognize the words in part. The old man never did get the credit he deserved, but now you are privileged to hear the opening line of his original poem which began: *"A grazing Mace, how sweet the hound that saved a wrench for me."*

Remember God's amazing grace. Remember to laugh sisters and brothers.

Remember to sing and pray and remember to love one another and all others as together we live into this year of Mission and live out the message of God's Grace and reconciliation in this Diocese, as we build up the Church to the glory and honor of Almighty God and share God's grace with all the world. Amen.

## **Closing Remarks**

Dear friends, shortly after my Consecration as a Bishop in the Church I attended the General Convention in Philadelphia, in this very building and space. At that Convention we elected The Rt. Rev. Frank T. Griswold the 25th Presiding Bishop of the Episcopal Church, a wise and faithful Primate. In one of his speeches on the subject of "reconciliation" he said: *"There is a field far beyond our understanding. I invite you to meet me there. When we arrive we will embrace, take off our shoes, and kneel down.*

*For we will know that we are on holy ground, in the presence of the One who loves us most."*

I believe we are standing on holy ground – we have been on holy ground – during our time together today.





Our beloved old Church is beleaguered with challenges on the local level, the national level and the international level. The need for local ministry and mission is so great and there never seems to be enough resources ~ money or people ~ to get the work done.

The Diocese seems to live in a constant state of tension watching for the sword of Damocles as regards the Bishop Diocesan's case. Our national and international problems are no "walks in the park" either and all sorts of grim prognostications are given about the future of the Church and the Anglican Communion. Add to this the intrusion into our religious world of the Bishop of Rome's invitation for unhappy Anglicans to become part of an Anglican particularate and we could easily sing the words of the old country western tune: "I've got heartaches by the number, troubles by the score." Or in the words of the old spiritual "Nobody knows the trouble I've seen, nobody knows but Jesus."

This we know, fellow believers: This is God's Church and we are but pilgrims on the journey and stewards – caretakers – of the Church and its mysteries; and all God calls us to be – all God asks of us – is to be faithful. We are called to have a fervent faith in the teachings of Christ and the Church and a stubborn hope in the promises that God has set before us now and in the life to come. I hope that each of you can leave this place with that fervent faith and stubborn hope as we go forward into this new year of mission and ministry in the Diocese of Pennsylvania. We can go forth with knowledge of how truly blessed we are in this part of God's vineyard, and despite the great need, that there are many faithful laborers for the harvest – for God's harvest.

I believe one of our greatest tasks and challenges at this time in history is to show the world that the Episcopal Church is one community of faith in which all of us love each other, pray with each other, and live together as a faith community and spiritual family.

In a world torn apart by racial and ethnic tensions, political conflicts and theological wars our expression of Christianity attempts to include all of God's children – regardless of how the world classifies and labels them: as women or men, old or young, black or white, gay or straight, conservative or liberal, Catholic or Evangelical – we are ALL God's children and all loved richly and equally by our Creator, saved by Christ our Redeemer and sanctified by the Spirit of God who indwells each of us and the Church. While we strive to be totally inclusive we also remember the importance of faithfulness to God, to God's Word, and to one another. You know, our expression of Christianity has been praying for and teaching about full inclusion for all people for decades and now that we are trying to live into that understanding there are some who don't seem to comprehend what "all" means. As we sang in the morning hymn at the start of this Convention: "All are welcome, all are welcome." Now can we put those words into action? Can we live into that teaching that "those who sing, pray twice," and make that song our prayer?

One of the important elements about the life of our beloved William White was that he was a both/and thinker. In Bishop White's time the People of God wrestled with the model of a Church that both mirrored the newly discovered freedom and independence of this young nation and the venerability of a Church that was fraught with monarchical roles and rules; but our foremothers and fathers in faith were able to live in that tension and create a model that included bishops, but without the absolute monarchical role. I am confident that Bishop White knew some of that crazy making kind of tension that the Church in the 21st century continues to struggle with but would ask with me today: "Do we love Jesus more than our own personal agenda? Do we love Jesus more than our Committees or treasuries or pet projects or personal needs and aspirations? Do we love Jesus more than our particular brand of orthodoxy? Do we love Jesus enough to be in solidarity with the least, the lost and the left out of our world? Can we learn to speak in words and resolutions that draw people IN rather than shut them OUT? Do we love justice and mercy as much or more than orthodoxy and spiritual correctness?" Dear friends that kind of crazy making tension is where people of faith live and move and have



their being – and it is in that tension where we find the Holy Spirit of God and where the Spirit speaks to us.

All are welcome! All are welcome in this Church, in this Diocese, in our common life together and those of us in the tent need to do everything necessary and possible to make room in the tent and at the table for all of God's children. But we can do all that dear friends with fervent faith and stubborn hope and a commitment to walk in the light of God. And so we pray,

*“O God, speak to us in the tension, Send your Spirit into the both/and moments and times of our journey and Spirit of the Living God fall fresh on us and speak to us. We ask all this in Jesus' Name.”*

Now I invite you to stand sing with me the words to that beloved old hymn: “God of grace and God of glory....”

# **Report of the Diocesan Council**

## **to the 226<sup>th</sup> Convention**

### **Diocese of Pennsylvania**

#### **November 14, 2009**

The Diocesan Council, comprised of thirty-three elected deanery delegates (One Clergy, Two Laypersons) and other ex-officio members as described in the Canons of the Diocese of Pennsylvania, including the Bishop, the Treasurer of the Diocese and the Secretary to Convention, met the work of the year with a renewed sense of mutual purpose and commitment to God's mission in the Diocese of Pennsylvania. In its normal course of organizing business in November, 2008 and January, 2009, the Diocesan Council welcomed the Rt. Rev. Allen Bartlett (ret.), Assisting Bishop, as its chair. In the Spring, the Diocesan Council thanked Bp. Bartlett for his time as Assisting Bishop and welcomed the Rt. Rev. Rodney Michel as Assisting Bishop as chair. As a reminder, between meetings of the Convention, the Diocesan Council is responsible for carrying out the program and budget priorities established by the Convention and attending to responsibilities as defined by the Canons.

Each member of the Diocesan Council was appointed to serve on one or more Diocesan leadership groups either by virtue of their election to such bodies or due to their interest in the mission and ministry of the particular group. The Executive Committee was elected as follows:

- The Rev. Kathryn Andonian, Vice-Chair, Church of the Holy Spirit, Valley Forge Deanery
- Mr. Joe Merlino, Church of the Holy Comforter, Conestoga Deanery

- Ms. Jeanette Woehr (Secretary to Council), Gloria Dei/Old Swede's, Southwark Deanery

In accordance with its Canonical responsibilities, the Executive Committee appointed the Rev. Kirk Berlenbach, Wissahickon Deanery, as chair of the Program Budget Committee. Other members appointed to the Program Budget Committee included:

Each month, Diocesan Council works to ensure that the decisions made by Convention are implemented and that it is responding to its responsibilities as



described in the Canons. Diocesan Council meetings include the following: a report on Diocesan issues and activities by the Bishop; a report by the Diocesan Council Executive Committee; a review of the status of the Diocesan Program Budget by the Treasurer and CFO of the Diocese, including the status of pledges; a review of the work of the Program Budget Committee for the upcoming year; an update regarding the work of the Committee on Finance and Property; a report on the work of various Diocesan committees by Council members appointed and/or elected to those committees, including: 2020 Committee, Camp Committee, Diocesan Youth Council, Stewardship Commission, Wapiti, Campus Ministry, Cathedral Chapter, Anti-Racism Commission, Black Aspirant Recruitment Consultative Task Force and the Mission Strategy Committee.

Among the notable actions taken by Diocesan Council in 2008-2009 were the following:

- Welcomed the Rt. Rev. Rodney Michel as the Diocese's new Assisting Bishop and Chair of Diocesan Council (March-May, 2009)
- Initiated stronger communications by placing a meeting summary on the Diocesan website (under the "News" section) after each meeting.
- In the face of a significant Program Budget deficit, approved approximately \$100,000 in program budget cuts as recommended by the Committee on Finance and Property (March, 2009).
- Crafted and sent two letters to the clergy and lay leaders of the Diocese describing the Program Budget deficit, announcing the program reductions and encouraging renewed support of the mission and ministries in the Diocese of Pennsylvania (March and May, 2009).
- Clarified and approved the designation of All Saints, Darby as a mission church (March, 2009).
- At the request of the Camp Committee, chaired by the Rev. Alexander Graham, Conestoga Deanery, approved a new model of summer youth camp whereby we would partner with the Delaware Diocese at Camp Arrowhead (March, 2009).
- Approved a six-year extension of "The Lutheran Episcopal Campus Ministry at Temple University," (LECM) under the leadership of the Rev. Gregory Wilson. The mission of this program is "to minister in the name of Jesus Christ to both Episcopal and Lutheran students, other students, faculty and staff at Temple University, and to seek to proclaim and live out the Word of God as a public witness to the love of God in Christ" (March, 2009).
- Voted to encourage parishes in the Diocese of Pennsylvania to observe an annual "Sea Sunday" on the first Sunday in October (or on another Sunday during the year) to promote awareness and support of Seamen's Church Institute (March, 2009).
- Approved concept of and drafted, in collaboration with the Standing Committee and the Mission Strategy Committee, a resolution on "Reconciliation and Planning" to be presented to the Diocesan Convention in November, 2009. The Resolution will seek to "encourage the Bishop and Standing Committee to appoint a Diocesan Mission Planning Commission, broadly representative of the Diocese, to review Christ's mission and ministry through the people of the



diocese of Pennsylvania; engage and consult diocesan leadership groups in an evaluation of these ministries, make recommendations for the future, and begin a process of reconciliation to help us move forward together in Christ” (May-November, 2009).

- Through the work of the Program Budget Committee, crafted a lean and realistic Program Budget for 2010. The proposed Program Budget was unanimously approved (June, 2009). The Diocesan Council also approved an amendment that any funds received in excess of the Program Budget be directed to Mission/Congregational Development planning (June, 2009).
- At its meeting on September 17 the Diocesan Council engaged a discussion of the upcoming Diocesan Convention; in particular, the establishment of a \$20/per person registration fee to cover the costs of the lunch. There was strong support voiced for the change of venue for the Convention and the plans to hold a lunch where attendees will be able to participate in conversations with one another. There was also a general acceptance of the need to request a reasonable registration fee to cover the costs of lunch; however, the Diocesan Council recognized that this departure from past practices could create concerns for some in the Diocese. In response, the Diocesan Council voted to make the 2009 Diocesan Convention registration fee voluntary; costs for the lunch not covered by the voluntary fee will be met through otherwise unexpended funds in the 2009 Program Budget.

## **Philadelphia Cathedral Deans Report to Convention 2009**

It has been a full and exciting year as we continue to experience and celebrate the growing vibrant presence and witness of our Cathedral within our Diocese, the City of Philadelphia and beyond. We share with all of the institutions of our diocese, the devastating impact of the world's financial crisis on our own already limited resources. Nevertheless we strive to achieve the cathedral's truly multi-faceted mission. That mission, first of all, is to draw the heart of anyone who steps inside nearer to the love and glory of God through the pull of the cathedral's interior beauty and by way of inspiring, yet relevant worship and continual prayer.

Week by week from last Advent to the present, the seasons of the liturgical year have been celebrated and observed with great solemnity and liturgical creativity, blending the Church's traditions from the most ancient to the most contemporary, and with diverse cultural expression. This year on Epiphany Last, the Mardi Gras Carnival tradition was introduced as an explosive, very colorful--and final--festive liturgy prior to the beginning of the somber barrenness of Lent. There were costumes and masks and the cathedral walls reverberated with the sounds of Missa Luba, a mass in Congolese style for choir and percussion. New this year at Holy Week were services of Taize Prayer and Tenebrae, as well as an expanded Triduum, including a change in the time of the Easter Vigil, at which an Initiation Class of 11 young people and adults made their baptismal commitments, with Bishop Michel presiding.

During the final six Sundays after Pentecost the cathedral has been observing a liturgical "Season of Creation," celebrating the fifteen billion year history of God's breathing and speaking the Universe into being and the emergence of our planet Earth and all of its creatures. The intention is for the worshipers to experience the inextricable link we share with each other, and to commit ourselves to loving and healing "this planet Earth, our island home." Each Sunday highlights a particular theme such as the peril of climate change, abuse of creation, dividing walls between peoples, warring nations, etc. The series concludes on the Reign of Christ Sunday. The liturgies have been enhanced by special music, guest speakers from Anglican, Jewish, Catholic and Protestant traditions, biblical and contemporary readings. Exceptional artistic expression and creative use of our worship space were provided by Ardie Brown from the Church of St. Andrew and Monica and Bill Roth from the Earthbourne Institute of Science, Spirituality and Culture. Discussion with each of the speakers follows the liturgy. The speakers include Derrick Pitts, Chief Astronomer of Franklin Institute; Malcolm Harris, Environmental Consultant; Professor Tom Connally, (Emeritus) UPenn, and Trainer in Centering Prayer; Renee McKenzie-Hayward, of Calvary St-Augustine's parish and the Cathedral Dean.

In addition to such Sunday celebrations as these, the tradition continues of Sunday Lauds preceding the Sunday liturgy, now led on a rotational basis by lay persons. The doors remain open daily for rest and prayer thanks to Cathedral Partners, volunteers from parishes in our diocese who act as hosts and help prepare for the noon day Eucharist, celebrated by diocesan as well as cathedral clergy.

At the core of Philadelphia Cathedral's life is a small but vibrant congregation. The highlight of this year has been the involvement of members of our congregation in outreach ministries including a ministry with St. Barnabas Mission that was recently featured on Channel 10. We



continue to see a gentle increase in new members who join the core congregation and become active members of our liturgical teams.

Highlights of our support of the gifts of artistry was evident as we hosted several exhibits by our own Artists in Residence – Zoe Cohen and Ava Blitz, plus local artists Doug Witmer and Marisha Simons. Dr. Lourin Plant of Rowan University shared his vocal gifts in several concerts, and our space was graced with special musical events including in A Four Hands – Four Feet Organ Concert, the 4th Annual Summer Organ Noonday Concert Series, and several Evensong services. Under the leadership of Dr. Riyehee Hong, our own Cathedral Singers shared their gifts in music ranging from Rheinberger's "*Stabat Mater*" to the recent Festival of Hymns where we celebrated the rich heritage of sacred hymns passed down through the centuries.

As the home to the Bishop and all the members of the Diocese, we hosted several interfaith conversations and events, and celebrated the ordination of candidates to Holy Orders, baptism, confirmation, and reception in our Rites of Initiation services. In the Spring, we were blessed to host the meetings that our Presiding Bishop, the Most Rev. Katharine Jefferts Schori, had with the laity and clergy of our Diocese and to welcome Bishop Rodney Michel as our Assisting Bishop.

Two profound events at the Cathedral were the traditional Absalom Jones service and a viewing of Katrina Browne's documentary, "Traces of the Trade: A Story from the Deep North" in which she told the story of her forefathers who were the largest slave-trading family in U.S. history.

For the first time this spring, we held a retreat for members of the Chapter and representatives of the congregation. From this important experience, we have begun the process of developing a Cathedral profile which will be central to our being able to call a new Dean in 2010.

None of this could be possible without the support and hard work of our staff, our congregation teams, volunteer clergy support, our Seminarian, Chapter members, Diocesan Partners and volunteers from all over the diocese. A warm thank you to them all.

## **Companion Diocese Committee 2009 Report**

The primary development in the program of the Companion Diocese Committee in 2008-2009 has been the decision to sponsor at the Diocesan level the ongoing work of the Epiphany Medical Mission, renamed the Epiphany Wellness and Water Filtration Mission because of its incorporation of the Water Filtration Project. The medical missions of 2008 and 2009 found that basic health education was needed in many of the smaller villages and that the lack of a supply of pure water contributed to suffering and high mortality, particularly among infants and young children. A ceramic filtration device in various sizes has been developed in Guatemala and accomplishes the water purification objective. It is our hope and plan to provide basic health education for wellness together with water filtration units for these communities through fund raising projects.

Our other immediate objective is to introduce a motion to this Diocesan Convention that will authorize the continuation of the Companion Diocese relationship with the Diocese



of Guatemala through the years 2011-2013. In the coming year we shall complete our fifteenth year of companionship with Guatemala, and we are aware that by 2013 we shall need to reexamine the program, and the reexamination should take place with the participation of the new Episcopal leadership that is on the horizon.

Meanwhile we continue with a number of programs in place, programs involving roughly fifteen of our own congregations and twenty-six Guatemalan congregations. We support and enable programs for food, health, and education. We have aided in producing a Guatemalan hymnal. We have supplied Spanish Prayer Books. We have aided in building churches and houses. We have given support to San Lucas Mission in San Lucas Toliman, a Roman Catholic community that has worked to help peasant farmers become self-sufficient through selling coffee at a fair price ([www.juananacoffee.com](http://www.juananacoffee.com)), and to an urban project that aids women who create and sell native crafts ([www.upavim.com](http://www.upavim.com)). And we have come to know through personal experience the warmth and love and faith of a delightful people. We have visited there. They have visited here. Many of our youth have had an extraordinary opportunity to meet and know Guatemalans, and there is hope that a youth trip will take place once again in the summer of 2010. Much can be said for a companionship that is so proximate.

The Committee usually meets on the fourth Monday of the month, except for the summer months, either at St. Martin's-in-the-Fields, Chestnut Hill, or at St. David's, Radnor. Elizabeth and David Rivers are the Co-Chairs of the Committee and may be contacted as noted above.

## The Spiritual Growth Resources Committee Report

The Spiritual Growth Resources Committee (SGRC) consists of lay and ordained persons whose mission is to support and strengthen the spiritual life of the diocese. We seek to be a resource for parishes and individuals in matters relating to prayer and spirituality.

The SGRC actively engages in ministry by:

- Offering two days of quiet reflection during the 2008-09 program year. Although gentle guidance was given during the sessions, these days are designed to be a gift of time which we give ourselves as we try to live at a sacred pace. They were held on Saturday, November 15, 2008, at St. James', Downingtown and Saturday, March 21, 2009, at Gloria Dei Church, Philadelphia.
- Offering a two-day overnight retreat entitled, *A Time Apart: Enter into Simple Silence and Quiet Prayer*, at Daylesford Abbey, Paoli, from Friday, January 16 to Saturday, January 17, 2009. The retreat was an opportunity for rest, simple presence to God, worship and community silent prayer. More than 30 lay and ordained Episcopalians and Lutherans attended.
- Creating brochures on spiritual disciplines and making them available to parishes and individuals in an easily printed downloadable format. Brochures exist for: Anglican Prayer Beads, Walking the Labyrinth, Spiritual Direction, Centering Prayer, Spirituality and Art Workshops, and Worship in the style of Taizé.
- Acting as a conduit for those seeking to work with a spiritual director.
- Providing a calendar of intercessions to all members of the Diocese. This is currently available through the Diocesan Website.
- Evaluating the work we have done in the past, exploring how we might be part of a healing presence within the diocese, and planning offerings for the first half of 2010. Committee members gathered at a retreat day on September 22, 2009 at the Church of Saint Martin-in-the-Fields
- Providing SGRC events for the 2009-10 program year: SGRC will co-sponsor with the Philadelphia Theological Institute an Advent retreat, led by Frank Griswold and Barbara Braver, from December 6 – 9, 2009, at Daylesford Abbey; *Pathways to Prayer* on February 20, 2010 at St. Mary's, Wayne; and two *Days of Quiet Reflection*, March 20 at Trinity, Ambler, and April 24 at Church of the Holy Spirit, Harleysville.

## **New Wine: The Lutheran and Episcopal Campus Ministry at Temple University**

The Temple Campus Ministry entered its sixth academic year of existence this fall and continues to grow and thrive on the main campus of Temple University.

Over the past academic year, the ministry was re-accredited by the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America as a funded Lutheran Campus Ministry. The re-accreditation report sung praises for the ministry; its work with students, presence on campus, board development and fundraising. The ELCA enthusiastically re-accredited the Temple Ministry.

In addition, the Episcopal Diocese of Pennsylvania and the Southeastern Pennsylvania Lutheran Synod renewed their Memorandum of Understanding, a document which governs the joint nature of the ministry. The two bodies renewed the agreement governing staffing, funding, accountability, and liability for an additional 4 years in an agreement signed by the Lutheran and Episcopal Bishops, the Standing Committee, and Synod/Diocesan Councils.

Programmatically, the Temple Ministry has formed a new partnership with Church of the Crucifixion at 8<sup>th</sup> and Bainbridge (an aided parish within the diocese). The partnership provides the campus ministry with space and a parish community as home. Students help with parish clean-up projects and now have a venue for ministries to the wider community. One recent event that has garnered a lot of success has been a monthly cooking event for area homeless shelters. Students have attended this event in droves to cook and break bread together in a ministry based out of Church of the Crucifixion. In addition to the homeless ministry, the Temple Ministry and Crucifixion partnered up to plan and implement a joint Easter Vigil for the first time this year. The event was a success with many new and old faces alike.

The Temple Campus Ministry has also gained recognition from then Lutheran Theological Seminary as an ongoing field education site for its students. In 2008/2009 the ministry hosted one field education student. This academic year, it will host two students. The ongoing placement for field education students shows the vitality and importance this ministry has as a model ministry for seminary students to experience.

Finally, the Temple Ministry has continued to raise a significant portion of its operating budget. Each year fundraising exceeds the Lutheran contribution by 1:2 dollars and matches or exceeds the diocesan contribution dollar for dollar. The Board and Students are deeply grateful for the support of the synod and diocese. Fundraising in 2009 has reached its capacity. With a steep economic recession, it's hard to imagine increasing fundraising overall in any way – fundraising which now exceeds \$42,000/year. The ministry continues to seek funding partners and ongoing funding from those parishes and individuals who have stood with it through the last six years.

In all, the diocese has much to be excited and enthusiastic about when it looks at the ministry at Temple. So many lives have been changed and we have found a way to connect with a new generation!

## **A Report from the Antiracism Committee of Episcopal Diocese of Pennsylvania to the 226<sup>th</sup> Diocesan Convention**

The Antiracism Commission (ARC) in 2008 was occupied in planning for the establishment of a Diocesan Antiracism Team (ART). Beginning in February 2009 team training and development commenced. Eleven members of our diocese responded to the call to form the ART and they gathered for 10 days of intensive training between February and June 2009. This training permitted the ART to gain a deeper understanding of the Crossroads analysis of the systematic nature of racism, its institutional impact and the process of institutional change. The team meets on the 2<sup>nd</sup> Tuesday of each month to further team bonding, visioning and strategic planning. It is the goal of the Antiracism Commission and Antiracism Team that our diocese continues to work to dismantle racism in and around our diocese.

In addition to the 10-day Team Training a 1-day Antiracism Orientation Workshop was offered in September 2009 to accomplish the following: 1) observe a Crossroads Ministry presentation of a training that the ART will customize for diocesan implementation, 2) allowed diocesan leaders who have not had previous exposure to the Crossroads analysis gain such and 3) permit those who need to satisfy canonical requirements for antiracism participate in an antiracism training event do so.



The goals of the ARC for 2009 are to:

1. To assist and ensure the work of the ART.
2. To assist the diocese in fulfilling General Convention Resolution 2006-A123 which called for each diocese to (a) collect and document the complicity of the Episcopal Church in the institution of slavery and in the subsequent history of segregation and discrimination and (b) collect and document the economic benefits The Episcopal Church derived from the institution of slavery.
3. To interact with the Antiracism work happening on all levels of our church life.

Formed in 1993 as a result of a vote at the 1992 Diocesan Convention The Middle East Study Group is a standing committee of our diocese.

From September through June we meet every other month in solidarity with Christians in the Holy Land. We advocate in support of the efforts by the United States to help create a just peace for Israelis and Palestinians. We align our efforts with The Episcopal Church USA, the Anglican Consultative Council and our Palestinian brothers and sisters in the Diocese of Jerusalem.

On Thursday November 19, The Middle East Study Group and Assisting Bishop Michel will host retired United States Ambassador Warren Clark in a talk outlining United States strategies to promote a final peace for Israel and Palestine. Warren is the Executive Director of Churches for Middle East Peace. Bishop Michel has written to invite all interested Episcopalians to attend. Saint Asaph's parish hall is the location for the talk, which is set for 7:30 PM.



## **Report of the Commission on Ministry, 2009**

The Commission on Ministry continues its essential work on behalf of the diocese and the larger Church with prayer, diligence, good spirit, and a healthy dash of humor. Members note that the work is the most satisfying and faith-affirming activity we participate in at the diocesan level. COM members well represent the diversity of our diocese. We are diverse in race, gender, liturgical style, economic status, geography, age, politics, and theological conviction. We trust that this diversity can itself encourage the congregations and clergy of the diocese to present an increasingly diverse group of nominees for ordination.

Thanks to the hard work of many and the arrival of the Rt. Rev. Rodney Michel as assisting Bishop, the Standing Committee was able to end the moratorium on accepting new people into the ordination process. The COM wishes to thank the clergy and people of the diocese for their understanding and support of the decision to establish the year-long moratorium.

Since the end of the moratorium the Rt. Rev. Edward Lee, Western Michigan, retired, has been doing yeoman's duty interviewing and advising literally dozens of lay people at all stages of the ordination process as well as maintaining contact with their sponsoring clergy. Heartfelt thanks are extended to Bishop Lee who has also continued to provide wisdom and oversight for our work as well as the necessary episcopal signatures required by canon. Thanks too to Ms. Arlene McGurk and the Rev. Joy Segal who serve as the Ecclesiastical Authority's liaisons to the COM.

There are currently twenty people at various stages of the process: two candidates and eight postulants for priesthood and ten people who are preparing for "nomination" (the formal invitation to participate in the pre-postulancy conference). We hope that four men will complete their preparation and be ordained to the transitional diaconate in June. Given the large number of potential nominees, the COM will hold two conferences in 2010, one in January and one in February. Note: Many of us continue to use the traditional term "aspirant" to describe those people in the earliest stages of the process. In the revision of the ordination canons in 2003 "aspirant" was dropped in favor of "nominee". The term reminds us that a call to ordained ministry is not primarily a private decision but is discerned in and by the Church. An individual "aspires", but the Church must "nominate".

Thanks to the excellent work and keen energy of the Rev. Dr. Pamela Nesbit, COM member and vocational deacon, and the Taskforce for Diaconal Formation which included Archdeacon Rev. James Ley, we crafted a proposal for the revitalization of the vocational diaconate in the Diocese. The proposal has been forwarded to the Standing Committee for its approval and implementation.

Members of the COM are prepared to talk with congregations about the ministry of all the baptized as well the specifics of the ordination process. There are quite a few essential steps that must be completed more or less in order. Please call Jill Mathis at Church House or any member of the COM for details.

The Ecclesiastical Authority has nominated the Rev. Whitney Altopp, the Rev. Thomas Eoyang, Mr. Andrew Kellner, the Very Rev. Renee McKenzie-Hayward, and Ms. Francis Wilson to begin five year terms. Their nominations must be approved by this Diocesan Convention. Note: To maintain the canonically required minimum of fifteen members, three people must be nominated each year. A large number of members will complete their terms



next summer. The COM asked that additional members be added this year to help prepare for that transition.

I know I speak for all the members of the COM when I say we are honored to serve the diocese and the Church as members of the Commission on Ministry. It is holy work, tremendously moving, and often very hard. But there is deep satisfaction and joy in seeing so many clear signs of the movement of the Holy Spirit in the lives of those whom God is calling to various ministries in the church.

Philadelphia Theological Institute continued its ministry of theological inquiry in the Diocese of Pennsylvania with an out standing program for the academic year, 2008-2009.

On November 13, 2008 the annual preaching day was held at St. Mary's Church, Cathedral Road, Philadelphia PA. The program was led by the Very Rev. John "Jep" Streit, Dean of St. Paul's Cathedral in Boston since 1995. Previously he served for eleven years as Episcopal Chaplain at Boston University.

Dean Streit led a structured program looking at the lectionary for the coming liturgical year with the purpose of equipping and energizing preachers. The workshop was interactive, with more questions raised than answers provided.

On February 2, 2009 the Rev. Dr. S. Mark Heim offered two separate programs. In the afternoon we offered a Clergy Colloquium with Dr .Heim and a responder The Rt. Rev. Fredrick Borsch The lecture and discussion was titled "Saved From Sacrifice: New Light for Preaching in Lent" This was held at the Brossman Center of The Lutheran Seminary in Philadelphia who were co-sponsors. The Lutheran Seminary was a good choice of location. Students could attend.

In the evening a public lecture was held at St. Paul's Chestnut Hill, 22 East Chestnut Hill Avenue, Philadelphia PA. The title of the lecture "The Scapegoat: Christ's Death and Our Theology" drew an audience from around the Diocese. St. Paul's Chestnut Hill is a co-sponsoring church. All co-sponsoring church members receive discounts or are admitted free to PTI events that have admission fees.

On March 23, 2009 a book launch occurred at Cathedral Village, Cathedral Road, Philadelphia, PA. PRAYING OUR DAYS: A GUIDE AND COMPANION is the latest book by the Rt. Rev. Frank T. Griswold the 25<sup>th</sup> Presiding Bishop of the Episcopal Church. The audience was very interested. Following his talk, Bishop Griswold signed books for those who wanted to purchase them.

On March 20 and 21 a weekend workshop was held at The Church of the Holy Spirit in Harleysville, PA. The topic for was “Emerging Ideas for Traditional Churches” with Brad Berglund This two day event offered an Taize workshop and worship on Friday evening. On Saturday the workshop was titled, “Worship As A Spiritual Practice-Emerging Ideas for Traditional Churches”. The event was co-sponsored by The Church of the Holy Spirit and the North Penn Choristers Guild. The church is a PTI sponsor.





The board was led by Dr. Daniell Hamby, chair. At the May 2009 meeting of the board the Rev. Thomas McClellan became the current chair. The Rev. Canon James L. Shannon serves as Executive Director.

PTI is funded by the contributions of interested individuals, a grant from the St. Andrew's Fund, The Bishop White Parish Library Association and program-sharing donations.

## **Report of the Diocesan Committee on Finance and Property**

The Committee on Finance and Property is charged with responsibility for oversight of the financial affairs of the Diocese and acts in any other business or executive capacity that may be required of it by this Convention that elects its fifteen members. In that role, it is the committee's responsibility to insure that all business practices within the diocese are handled in a manner consistent with the practices of the Episcopal Church, the Diocesan Canons, and in compliance with all local, state and federal laws governing our charter. It is my belief as Chairman that our committee has acted in accordance with the requirements of our Canons. While we all have faced the most challenging economy of recent decades, I believe the Committee has seen progress in financial matters and we are upbeat in our hopes for the coming year.

At the beginning of our current budget year, Finance and Property and Diocesan Council recognized that our revenue expectations as stated in the budget would not be met. Collegially, our committee, Diocesan Council and the Standing Committee worked through a plan that would lead to financial stability through the year. Assuming pledges continue to be paid on a timely basis, we expect to finish the year in good financial health.

The Reverend Christine Ritter has been very active in the maintenance and repair of vacant church properties we manage and has successfully sold a number that we have no reason to hold. She has overseen the management and upkeep of our Wapiti property as we work with the Prudential Fox realtor team entrusted with the marketing of that property. We all are thankful that Christine has been such a faithful steward of our property.

In regards to Wapiti, the level of interest from potential buyers reflects a very weak real estate market in this area and across the country. Nonetheless, proposals have been presented and most have been rejected because of unacceptable offer prices. At the time of this report, two prospective buyers have been identified and discussions continue. Following Convention's direction last year, Finance and Property, Diocesan Council and Standing Committee must reach a consensus on any viable offer.

I am pleased to announce that the Bishop's Revolving Loan Fund has been revived with the help of The Reverend Reed Brinkman and funding from the Standing Committee. In recent years, loans were somehow allowed to lapse or weren't paid. A new discipline will allow this modest fund to once again be an effective tool in this diocese.





Two other matters worthy of comment point to further progress in this diocese. This year, the parochial reports of our member churches were submitted in a timelier manner than in previous years. Our committee is grateful for all who contributed to those reports, allowing a more accurate and fair assessment calculation. As well, Briggs Bunting, our auditors, delivered a report that suggested genuine progress in financial management of all components of this diocese. I once again thank Rob Rogers, Earl Irby and Jennie Paddy for all of their contributions over the past year. I am also grateful to Everett Gillison, George Whitfield, Ken Werner, and the Reverends Jim Wynn and Frank Allen for their contributions as committee members. These five men will not be seeking reelection this year.

When I write about improved financial management practices over recent years, I would be remiss if I didn't recognize Kylius Jones, our former Treasurer who completed his term this past summer. Keel was a constant presence at Church House and a wonderful resource for the professional staff and for the governance bodies as well. He unselfishly offered his skills to help untangle the financial confusion he found when he came into office. All who know Keel are grateful for his contribution. We wish him well as we do his successor, Joe Suprenuk.

## **Seamen's Church Institute: A Longtime Partner in Outreach**

Since 1843 SCI has been meeting the spiritual, emotional and practical needs of seafarers. A Seamen's Church Chaplain or Ship Visitor greets each of the more than 1,800 ships docking each year in our region, offering hospitality and support services to 40,000 mariners annually.

Most young seafarers today are from poor, developing countries and join a ship to lift their families out of poverty, see the world and acquire valuable work skills. Yet they face 9-10 months per year of isolation, long, hard days in difficult conditions, and a lack of contact with loved ones.

SCI staff and volunteers greet the seamen, determine and then work to meet their needs. Services to help the seafarers take many forms including, but not limited to:

- Providing visiting seafarers transportation to area retailers who understand and meet their unique customer service issues
- Offering seamen a way to contact home using phone cards or the internet
- Supplying them warm clothes from our Clothing Bank
- Offering seamen recreation, a warm gathering place, and a new Chapel
- Providing counseling
- Conducting worship services and Bible study
- Helping resolve ship board problems and conflicts through mediation and advocacy

Since 9/11, important new responsibilities have been imposed on the work of the Seamen's Church Institute. The new roles thrust upon us are vital to everyone in the Philadelphia region. We're helping the businesses that keep our port a vital part of the region's economy step up to the post-9/11 challenges. We truly have become critical to homeland security and port safety.

The time ashore that we make possible is essential to vessel and port safety, as many ship captains have told us. Modern ships require alertness and a state of mind that diminishes sharply after long periods at sea, their captains say. Seafarers need time ashore. This is particularly true with vessels calling at the many oil and chemical port facilities along the Delaware River. We're helping avoid accidents and security breaches that could kill people on the ships and on shore – and cause a costly disruption in the local economy.

SCI plays another important role. The seafarers trust us. So they turn to us to report safety, security, and suspicious matters aboard their vessels.

SCI's partnership with the Diocese and its generous support allows us to deliver on our vital mission to the seafarer's. ### **Report to Diocesan Convention, October 2009**

The Diocesan Stewardship Committee seeks to develop Stewardship as a Christian practice at all levels: personal, parish, diocese and in the wider world—financial stewardship and stewardship of all the resources given by God into our care. The Committee is currently holding and encouraging local conversations about stewardship among clergy and laity beginning at the deanery level, listening and sharing the local experience of our parishes and people. From these conversations, we hope to develop resources and experiences that draw us into a deeper engagement of stewardship on all levels, where we practice that daily conversion as God's children in Christ.

The Committee has held Stewardship Conferences in the Brandywine Deanery, the Southwark Deanery, and in the Merion Deanery. These conferences were well received, both experiencing elements of successful programs (Bible study, personal stewardship stories, and practical discussions) and sharing of program design and experiences among the several parishes in attendance. Feedback from participants (mostly lay people) points to an increased level of excitement, a clearer sense of direction as Stewardship leaders, and a lot of fresh ideas to bring back to the parish.
